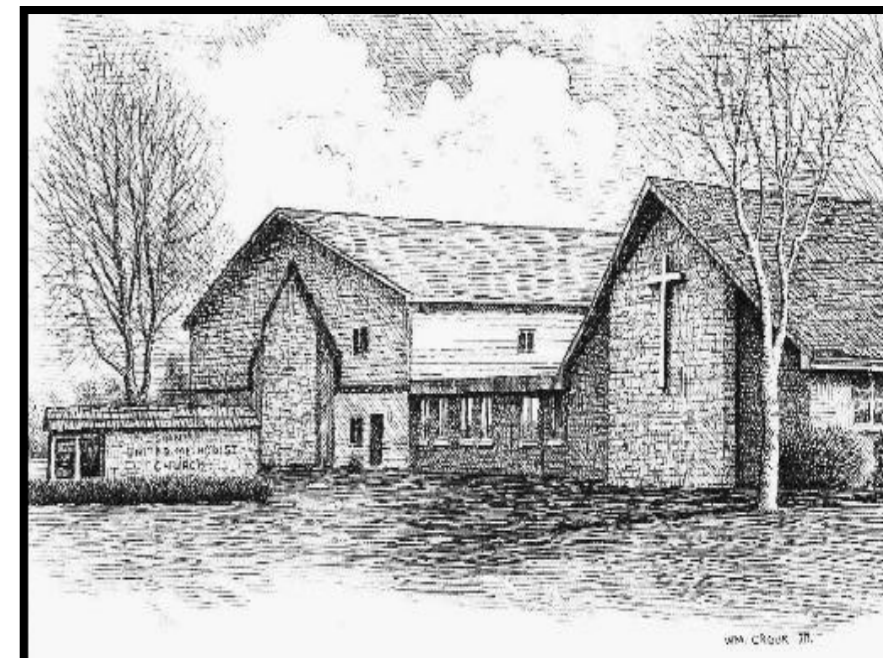

## From the Pastor

### “24/7 Christians”

One day Jesus took a seat in a boat and began teaching his followers who were on shore. When he was finished he told Simon Peter: **“Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.” Peter answered: “Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet, if you say so, I will let down the nets.”** The scripture tells us that they caught so many fish that their nets began to break.

It is an awesome challenge to put ourselves in the shoes of the disciples. Could we do what they did after a miracle like this? Jesus said: **“From now on you will be catching people. When they reached shore, they left everything and followed Jesus.”** (Luke 5:1-11)

There was a permanent change in course for their lives. Never again would the necessities of this world be their goal. Like the nets they let down into the deep, so from that day on they cast their lives out into a dangerous, hostile world to follow Jesus and to make new disciples in his image.

They had no inkling where this journey would take them. Yet, they followed and learned on the go. Then came the darkness of Good Friday. Jesus was dead and the disciples all ran away in fear for their own lives. Everything appeared to be lost except that God did the first replay in history and reversed the ruling on the field of Good Friday. Jesus was raised to live forever.

Because of the resurrection and despite their weaknesses the disciples carried on the mission of Jesus in his absence and eventually made a big impact. Through many sacrifices many more followers were gathered. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, the body of Jesus, the church, was born. The followers were persecuted and many died, but the gospel of Jesus thrived against the odds. Today we do not appreciate enough how Jesus transformed those ordinary fishermen into fishers of people.

What Jesus did for them he can do for everyone who follows him. Are we ready then to cast our nets out into the deep for the sake of all the miracles God makes possible for us?

It is human nature to cling to the shore. Today Sunday has become just another shopping day in our culture. Many stores are open 24/7. Many who have

to work on the Sabbath are penalized if they take an hour off to worship. There is hardly a Sunday where sports, shopping or sleeping in doesn't feel more attractive than life with Jesus. Most churches struggle to find willing volunteers to teach the children on Sundays and to fill many other volunteer opportunities as well.

Where does Jesus fit in then? How do we maintain our focus on the ‘bread of life,’ when we are so busy trying to find bread for ourselves somewhere else? What example is being set for the future?

Our choices are not all bad. But when the trivial squeezes out time for the more important then God's Word today is much like “seed sown among the thorns.” We hear the word of God; “but the cares of the world and the delight in riches, and the desire for other things, enter in and choke the word, and it proves unfruitful.” (Mark 4)

Families are under severe stress today. Many don't make it. Some blame this on husbands and wives both working outside the home. But I don't think so. The problem is not too many choices either. The problem is there is too little Jesus in the heart. If we had more Jesus, we could handle the choices because there would be less selfishness and more generosity. Less blame, more forgiveness. Less strife, more cooperation. Less competition, more humility. Less unhappiness and more volunteers to do God's mission!

Following Jesus is not something we do only for an hour or two each week, but is ongoing. Christians are like Wal-Mart. They keep the door open for God - 24 hours, 7 days a week. We may not leave everything and everyone behind in a literal way like the first disciples. But following Jesus does mean living for the new priorities of God's Kingdom and leaving behind a world centered on the self.

The world needs more of Jesus. All our problems today will not be solved without more of Jesus. There is no higher praise we can offer than making him more a part of everything we do and are every day. Are you and I 24/7 Christians?

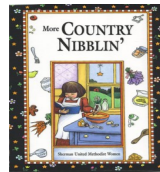

He is working on his Bachelor of Arts degree in psychology with a minor in business administration. Concerned about the decline in healthy marriages, he wants to become a marriage and family therapist.

Together we are making a wonderful difference in the lives of these children. We have around 250 children in our program, ages 2-13. One on one time is so important and our army of volunteers create a fun nurturing environment for every child who comes for a meal and finds the love of Christ. The need is great, our numbers in one year’s time have grown from 806 meals served in Aug. 2010 to 1500 meals served in Aug. 2011! We have distributed around 253 filled book bags with school supplies for the children, we help with homework and provide a 12 station computer lab, library, games and mentoring. Isaiah 58:10, if you spend yourselves on behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like noonday.”

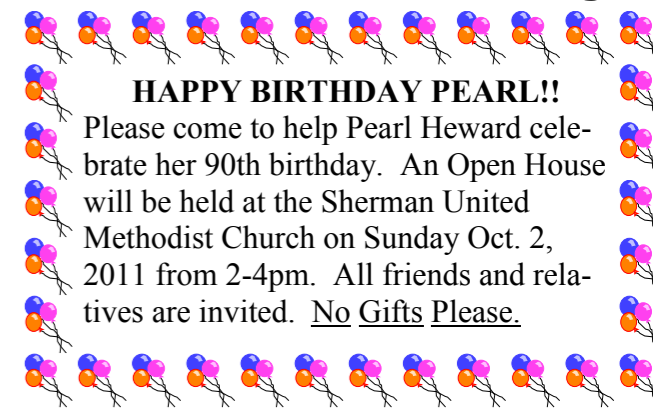

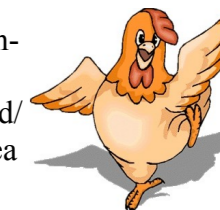

**Directions for Accessing SUMC Online Info**

1. Go to [www.shermanumc.org](http://www.shermanumc.org)
2. Go to "links" section on left side of main screen and click on "individual membership data."
3. A sign in screen will appear. The FIRST TIME you visit you will need to click on "Need a log in." The computer will ask you for your email address and first/last name. The computer will then match you to information that has been entered for you by SUMC. If a match is found, the computer will email you a password. If a match is not found and you have more than one email address, you may need to try again.
